
In closing I would like to thank everyone for their dedication and commitment on this emotional & historic journey.

National Gathering on Unmarked Burials: Upholding Indigenous Laws

I attended the event on March 27, 28, and 29th, 2023. I found the National Gathering on Unmarked Burials informative. Sharing from panel speakers and Survivors from many parts in Canada has informative. The Special Interlocutor has identified measures needed, recommendations for new federal legal framework, and to ensure the respectful and culturally appropriate treatment of unmarked graves and burial sites of Missing Children of former residential schools. The Special Interlocuter has a two year mandate. Special Interlocutor has been engaged with First Nations, Inuit and Metis people, and has examined existing federal and provincial laws, and identified areas of improvement in Canadian law and make recommendations for new legal frame- work on unmarked burial sites on former Indian Residential Schools and lands associated with the schools. At the Gathering photos were taken and live-streamed. Indigenous Teachings were included where Elders and Knowledge Keepers shared with audience or in separate rooms. Protocols, a Sacred Fire was lit at the Osgoode Hall Grounds and remained throughout the duration of the Gathering. Wellness and Cultural Health Supports were available throughout the Gathering, therapeutic services were available,



medicine teas, Sweetgrass, Cedar and Sage were available for Survivors. Breakfast and lunch was served everyday. Youth had their own Sharing Circles about Unmarked Burials and were part of panel speakers. There was table/booths of information available to ask questions regarding unmarked burials and names of Missing Children of former residential schools. Arts and Crafts were available to Survivors as part of healing. Staff for the Gathering was always available. I found by attending the Gathering has helped in many ways to more understand the Unmarked Graves and Burials, and Survivors that shared their experience of Love Ones that never came home. For many it was an Emotional moment. I like to say Miigwetch to the Lac Seul First Nation Initiative; Bringing Our Children Home for letting me attend the important National Gathering on Unmarked Burials. Kitchi Miigwetch
